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RETURN TO SCHOOL ARRANGEMENTS

Following a transformational summer, we are looking forward to welcoming our young people back to school for the Autumn Term.

As you will be aware, the implications of COVID are still with us. In line with guidance provided by the Department of Education and the Local Authority, we are making some adjustments to the start of our school year.

All students are required to complete TWO Lateral Flow Tests (LFT) during their first week back in school. We have made the following arrangements to ensure this happens safely and with minimum disruption to the children's education.

MONDAY 6 SEPTEMBER

Years 7 and 11 students **ONLY** invited to take part in COVID testing
at the following times:
Morning 9:00am - 11:00am
Midday 11:30am - 1:00pm
Afternoon 1:30pm - 3:30pm

TUESDAY 7 SEPTEMBER

All students return to school by 8:50am for the first day of term. Years 8 and 9 students only invited to take part in COVID testing, form by form, during the school day.

As we have already received consent from parents of students in Year 8 to 13 who attended our school during the 2020/2021 academic year, there is no need to complete another consent form. However, if you no longer wish for your child to take part in testing, please contact us as soon as possible by emailing testing@cwcscoventry.co.uk. Parents of students in Year 7 will be contacted separately regarding consent for the new academic year.

If a student's test is positive, then we will contact home immediately and ask you to arrange a PCR test for your child. Your child will need to self-isolate whilst waiting for the PCR test result.

As with previous guidance, if your child is displaying COVID symptoms or has tested positive for COVID-19, please do not send them to school.

In a change from last academic year, we have been advised that close contacts of positive cases do not need to self-isolate. Instead, close contacts who are not displaying symptoms, should continue to attend school while we await the result of the PCR test.

As a school, we will remain vigilant and maintain certain safeguards to help mitigate the risks of COVID-19 for our community. We will therefore continue with our heightened cleaning regime and increase ventilation around the site. We will continue to regularly update our risk assessment and review our health & safety protocols in line with the advice and guidance provided by the authorities.

COVID-19 Update

There are changes for this year to self-isolation if we do have positive cases in school:

"From 16 August 2021, children under the age of 18 years old will no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case. Instead, children will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace, informed they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test."

We would encourage all individuals to take a PCR test if advised to do so. 18 year olds will be treated in the same way as children until four months after their 18th birthday, to allow them the opportunity to get fully vaccinated. At which point, they will be subject to the same rules as adults and so if they choose not to get vaccinated, they will need to self-isolate if identified as a close contact."

It is also worth noting that if there were a significant number of positive cases in school, the requirement to self-isolate could be re-introduced.

Face coverings will generally no longer be required for pupils, staff and visitors, either in classrooms or in communal areas, although if your child would prefer to use one, that is absolutely fine. However, there are some circumstances where face masks will be needed, including on the school buses.

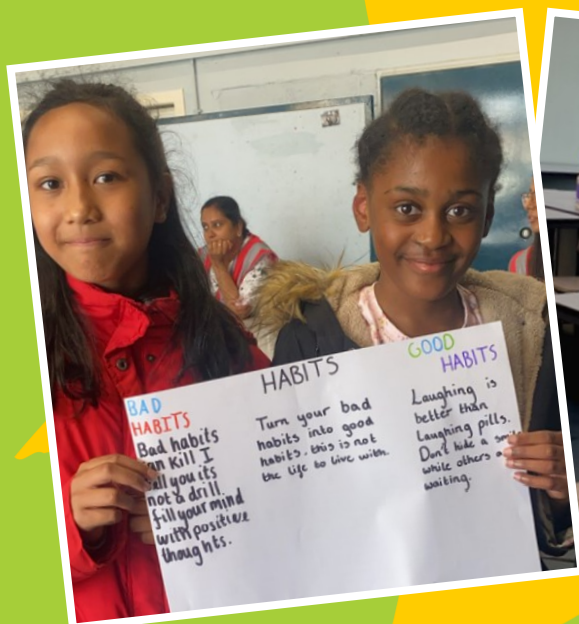
Summer School

Online Safety Tips for Children

Wow, it's September already! The month when autumn officially starts and ... oh yeah, the beginning of a new school year. Every cloud has a silver lining though! Another term means new friends to make, different stuff to learn, fresh online trends to jump on and exciting new games to play on your phone, computer or console. We've compiled a list of our top tips to ensure that - whether you're going online to chat, research things or just have fun - you can do it safely.

Be cautious with your profile

Be careful not to give out too much info on your social media or gaming profiles. Details like your full name, address or school's name could all help strangers to actually find you offline. A trusted adult can help you make your profiles private - so only your family and actual friends can contact you.

Lock your devices

Taking your phone or tablet to school? Turn password protection on. It keeps your private info safe and stops anyone accessing your device without permission. Passwords should be memorable to you - but difficult for anyone else to guess. Get a trusted adult to write it down in case you forget it!

Be smart with screen time

Too much screen time, especially just before bed, can affect your quality of sleep. Losing sleep, or not sleeping well enough, messes with your concentration and energy levels. Try muting notifications so you don't get pinged late at night; you'll feel fresher and more focused the next day.

Know how to deal with bullies

Sadly there are people online who enjoy picking on other users. If you ever feel like you're being bullied online - by anyone, not just someone from school - talk to a trusted adult about it. Together, you can discuss possible steps, such as blocking or reporting the person who's targeting you.

Manage online relationships wisely

Most people in a relationship chat to their partner online. Just be mindful that once you send a pic or message (even if it's private), you no longer control who else might see it. Messaging someone you've never actually met - and who might not be who they say - is definitely best avoided.

React well to inappropriate content

When you're researching something online, there's always a chance of finding content that makes you feel uncomfortable or upset. If this happens, you can report it as inappropriate and (hopefully) get it taken down. Tell a trusted adult what happened: they'll help you decide what to do next.

Report offensive in-game chat

If you game online with your mates, you'll know things can get competitive and heated on the in-game chat. Playing against people you don't know (especially if they're older) raises the risk of offensive comments and even threats. Our advice? Find out how to block or mute those bad losers.

Learn to spot fake news

If you're looking into a topic for homework or a project, be careful not to get taken in by fake news: content that's deliberately created to mislead people. Check the story with credible sources, like the BBC or Sky News. Trust your instincts, too - if it seems too unbelievable to be true, it's probably fake.

Keep it 'real' with online friends

Everyone enjoys adding friends and followers on social media. It's important, though, that the people you interact with online really are your friends. If they're just random people you've connected with to increase your contacts, you don't know if they could be trolls or bullies (or worse).
